
The Presidential Election

- Twelve Days to Go to Election Day
- HRC & Trump Bases Still Solid
- But Undecided Breaking HRC
- Focus Now on Swing States, Voter Turnout, and Possible Senate Election Victory for Ds
- Some R States Looking Blue But Will Hold R
- Lets Take A Look At the Map ...



Based on Last Six Presidential Elections, Democrats May Hold a Slight Advantage Heading into 2016 General Election

States That Voted Consistently In The Past Six Presidential Elections




Analysis

- Democrats won 18 states plus the District of Columbia six times in a row, which in 2016 would earn 242 electoral votes, about 90 percent of the 270 electoral votes needed to win.
- In contrast, Republicans consistently carried 13 states over the last six elections, which in 2016 would earn the party 102 electoral votes,
 38 percent of the 270 needed to win.
- The average state that voted Democratic in the past six elections delivers I3 electoral votes, while the average state that voted Republican in the past six elections delivers 8 electoral votes.





Dems Start With a 242-102 Advantage, but Several States are Reliably Red in 2016








The First Tier of the 12 Swing States Are "Indicators"

Any Surprises in These May Point to a Larger Trend




DEM - 233

Presidential Election – Takeaways

- Historically, Presidential race tightens in closing two weeks, but HRC still favored to win.
- HRC can win just by defending blue territory (home field advantage).
- Trump must regain leads in AZ, NC, and FL, and find 11 more EVs to reach 270.
- A look at the next closest blue states:
 - PA (20); VA (13); CO (9); NV (6) NH (4)
- Trump must win OH, NC, FL, AZ, NH, NV, & ME-2; Clinton wins by just taking one and holding on in PA.
- On election night, watch early returns in FL (7:00pm EST) and NC & OH (7:30pm EST)





Further Focus on Key States: HRC

- HRC Wins If Holds VA (+8), PA (+5), WI (+6), MI (+10) & CO (+6.8) AND can lose OH (-1), FL (+3) and NC (+2) (272-264)
- HRC Wins If Wins FL (+3) and Loses PA (+5),
 OH (-1) & NC (+2) (281-255)
- HRC Wins If Wins PA, VA, and NC
- These are the Three Key Swing States for HRC





Presidential Election Bottom Line

- HRC Has Momentum and the Votes
- HRC Has Key Voting Blocks
- DT Has Very Narrow Path to Victory
- DT Has Alienated Key Voting Blocks
- HRC Wakes Up on 11/9 the President-Elect
- DT Wakes Up on 11/9 Talking to Lawyers





Senate Elections Update

- Republican Senate Through 2016
- Senate 54 current Republican Senators
- Senate 46 current Democratic Senators
- Senate 100 Senators 60 votes important
- Need <u>Republicans & Democrats</u> to get to 60 votes to stop filibuster and to pass most bills






Senate Elections Update

- 2016 Senate Election Republicans overexposed
- The majority could change, but will be only slight margin
- Election: Republicans are defending 24/34 seats
- Dems Need 4 or 5 seats to gain majority
- Current Larry Sabato (UVA) Senate prediction (10/20/16)
 - 47 R/47 D
 - 6 toss-up seats: NV, IN, PA, NH, NC, MO

Senate Elections Update

Closer Look at the 6 Toss-Up Seats

GOP: 50 TOSS-UP: 3 Dem: 47 Bayh (D) lead Heck (R) & Cortez down to +3; GOP PA IN Masto (D) tied; Heck momentum; led throughout TOSS-UP summer; TOSS-UP Race tied in mid-40s; Toomey (R) + 2 in **TOSS-UP** mid-40s; LEAN GOP MO NC NV Blunt (R) +4; number Burr (R) +2 in midbriefly dipped but now 40s; has almost recovered; LEAN GOP recovered from bad





Senate Elections Update – Takeaways

- GOP Had a Good September Took commanding leads in OH and FL, though perhaps at expense of MO & NC.
- Outcome Still Very Fluid All six toss-up races still inside MoE.
- All Politics Is Local Dems want to nationalize the election and tie GOP candidates to Trump but GOP trying to keep their distance.
- **GOP candidates succeeding** in outperforming Trump in their states, though lopsided Clinton lead in NH is troubling for Senate race.
- HRC Winning May Hurt Dems Her unfavorables may prompt split-ticket votes to "check" her power ('96 strategy).
- <u>Bold Prediction</u> Whoever has the majority in 2017 will have fewer members than GOP currently has (54).
- <u>Looking Ahead</u> Democrats overexposed in next election cycle (25 of 33 seats up for reelection in 2018).





Senate Elections Update – Takeaways

- It is a 47-47 Tie with Race Decided by Six States
- The Key Six States Are PA, NH, WI, MO, NV, and FL
- PA HRC Helps Dems (McGinty) Win
- NH Hasan Helps HRC Win
- WI HRC & Feingold Help Each Other Win
- MO Kander Helps Himself Win
- NV Latino Vote Helps HRC & Cortez-Masto Win
- FL Rubio Holds On and Republicans Win





Senate Elections Update – Takeaways

- The Result With Democrats Winning NH, NV, NC, IN, PA
- 52-48 Democratic Controlled Senate
- Say Hello to Senate Majority Leader Schumer
- Say Hello to Senate Minority Leader McConnell
- The Senate Leadership Looks for Compromise
- President Clinton Looks to the Senate to Work with the White House on a Legislative Agenda and Then Goes to Speaker Ryan of the House of Representatives





House Elections Update

- House 246 Republicans (1 vacancy)
- House 186 Democrats (2 vacancies)
- House need 218 for majority
- Election all 435 seats up for election
- Election Dems need 30-seat gain for majority





House Elections Update

- Current prediction Republicans hold House, though with a smaller majority (circa net-20).
- House will likely stay Republican through 2022.
- Republicans actually control more state legislatures now than when the current Congressional map was drawn in 2012.
- If that advantage holds until 2022, the next round of Congressional redistricting will be just as favorable to Republicans, if not more.





Overview of The Potential New Congress

- The Majority Party in Senate will have no more than 52 or 53 Seats and not be filibuster proof
- Senate Leadership will be looking for old and new members willing to work across the aisle like the old "Gang of Eight"
- Possible Candidates for bi-partisanship include Senators Bennett (D-CO), Warner (D-VA), Flake (R-AZ), McCain (R-AZ), and Possibly New Members





The New Congress & Business

- The House Will Stay Republican and Therefore Remain a More Pro-Business Body Than the Senate
- The Senate Will Have Normal Partisan Fights, But Leadership Will Look for Compromise on Pro-growth Policies
- The Senate Leadership Senators Schumer & McConnell –
 Will Protect Their Flank Protect Senators Up in 2018 While Looking for Ways to Move the Country Forward





The New Congress & Business

The Threats to the Business Community From the New Congress Will Include:

- 1. Tax Reform Which Closes Some Loopholes
- Increased Business Taxes Mixed in With Lower Repatriation Tax for Corporations to Pay for Infrastructure Programs
- 3. ACA Fix Would Mean Higher Costs to Taxpayers, Including Business
- 4. Potential Government Stalemate





2017 Potential Congressional Issues

- Tax Reform
- 2. Infrastructure Repair and Growth
- 3. Foreign Policy Reset and Military Spending
- 4. Energy Policy
- 5. Select Health Care Issues Drug Pricing
- 6. Immigration Reform
- 7. Possible Supreme Court Opening
- 8. A Lot of Noise from the Left and Right
